SUBSCRIPTION TRAPS

Good deals can bait you into falling for expensive traps!

A subscription trap can trick you by offering "free" or "low-cost" trials of products and services. Products commonly offered are weight loss pills, health foods, pharmaceuticals and anti-ageing products.

Scammers use websites, emails, social media platforms and phones to reel people in. Remember, Once you provide your credit card information to cover shipping costs, you are unknowingly locked into a monthly subscription. Delivery and billing can then be difficult, if not almost impossible, to stop.

high-pressure sales tactics like a "limited time offer" are often used to rush you into making a decision.



Tips to protect yourself:

- Trust your instincts. If it's too good to be true, don't signup.
- Before you sign up for a free trial, research the company and read reviews, especially the negative ones. The Better Business Bureau is a great source of information.
- Don't sign up if you can't find or understand the terms and conditions. Pay special attention to pre-checked boxes, cancellation clauses, return policies, and any vague charges.
- If you go ahead with a free trial, keep all documents, receipts, emails, and text messages.
- Regularly check your credit card statements for frequent or unknown charges.
- If you have trouble cancelling your subscription, contact your credit card provider, your local consumer protection organization, or law enforcement agencies.





PURCHASE OF MERCHANDISE SCAMS

Not all online vendors are reputable!

Online shopping is a favourite pastime for many consumers. But many deals you see online—from inexpensive designer purses to significantly discounted electronic goods—are too good to be true.

Fraudsters can create accounts on legitimate auction sites, such as eBay, or on an online marketplace. like Kijiji or Craigslist. They will advertise their products at very low prices, enticing you to buy them.

At the end of the day, if you do get something, it might be of poor quality or a bad imitation of what you expected.

In other instances, fraudsters will lure you into clicking on sponsored links that will direct you to a seemingly genuine website. If you decide to buy from there, you won't benefit from any protection or services that

legitimate websites offer.

- Buy from companies or individuals you know by reputation or from past experience.
- · Never make a deal outside the auction site.
- Beware of sellers from far away or that have limited or no reviews.
- Use a credit card when shopping online; many offer protection and may give you a refund.
- Be wary of websites that contain spelling mistakes and grammatical errors.
- Read the refund and return policies carefully, including the fine print.
- Ask the supplier questions and confirm service delivery timelines and the total cost.





IDENTITY THEFT

Help ensure your identity remains yours alone!


Scammers are always on the lookout to collect or reproduce your personal information to commit fraud. Thieves can make purchases using your accounts, obtain passports, receive government benefits, apply for loans, and more. This could turn your life upside down.

Fraudsters use techniques that range from unsophisticated to elaborate. Offline, they can go through trash bins or steal mail. Online, they can use spyware and viruses, as well as hacking and phishin.

They look for credit card information, bank account details, full name and signature, date of birth, social insurance number, full address, mother's maiden name,

online usernames and passwords, driver's licence number, and passport number.

Identity theft is a serious crime!



Tips to protect yourself:

- Never provide your personal information over the phone, via text message, email or the internet.
- Avoid public computers or Wi-Fi hotspots, such as in coffee shops, to access or provide personal information; they put you at risk.
- Create strong and unique passwords for each of your online accounts. Password-protect your devices and home Wi-Fi network.
- Use a secure and reputable payment service when buying online—look for a URL starting with "https" and a closed padlock symbol.
- Avoid giving out personal information on social media.
 It can be used along with your pictures to commit fraud.
- Always shield your PIN when using your card. If you hand it over to a cashier, never lose sight of it.
- Shred and destroy documents with personal information.





WATER FIRST -Water Internship

On September 23, 2022, community and family members, Water First staff and other supporters joined together to celebrate the next generation of Indigenous water treatment plant operators as they graduated from the Drinking Water Internship Program. This program, a partnership with Waabnoong Bemjiwang Association of First Nations, Gezhtoojig Employment & Training Anishinabek Nation and Water First, launched in June 2021 in the Georgian Bay area of Ontario.



Highlights from Graduation Day



COZGRATS GRADS

During the 15-month internship program, each intern accumulated 1,800 hours of on-the-job experience in water treatment plants, which is a part of the water operator in training (OIT) certification process. Interns also pursued additional water operator certification exams including water quality analyst and the entry-level course for drinking water operators, as well as environmental relevant training like GIS and water sampling which can lead to work in both drinking water treatment and the environmental water field. Following graduation, interns join the Water First Alumni Network to stay engaged, build local networks and access opportunities for ongoing professional development and peer support.

Each and every one of the 14 graduates displayed incredible dedication and skill throughout the course of their internship. After weeks of hands-on instruction in treatment plants, or in the environment learning monitoring and sampling techniques, there is no doubt that these impressive young adults will do great things for their communities. *Congratulations Graduates!*

Clubs in Good Standing Policy Addition

At the recent Civitan International Board of Directors meeting, verbiage was added to a policy that affects all clubs, including at large ones. It requires each club to report their officers in order to be certified.

While this has always been the case, it was pertinent to put that clause in writing for all members to understand. Other requirements of clubs in good standing include financial obligations fulfilled, club officer training completed, and the existence of some sort of governance document. Remember, this policy leads to certification to vote in Civitan International Elections.

Club Officer Training

For Civitan International's "at large" clubs in areas of the world like Canada, Europe, Asia and Africa, club officer training is required for certification but it also considered "on your own." Members in these clubs are certainly allowed to participate in the trainings on Civitan University, located at www.civitan.org. Once there, click on Resources, then Member Center and then Leadership.



These trainings are in English, but closed captioning can be enabled for better understanding. It's also a great way for the training to be tracked so there are no questions in the spring about whether or not your club officers are trained!

In addition, for Canadian clubs, last year's specific Canadian treasurer training has been posted on the Civitan International Vimeo channel for free for use by these officers.

Currently, no deadline has been set for training to be completed in the "at large" clubs. A current proposal that will be before the board suggests January I, 2023. Updates to come on its pending approval.

Working with Autistic People During Emergency Situations – Sensory Kits

Hi all,

This project was in the Summer Edition of the Beaver Tales but after the London Middlesex Club got involved in providing 10 kits for the local police, I wanted to share some tips and further info with everyone. Hope the following helps any of you interested in this project

- 1) Definitely American info for \$300, not sure how they did it but, no way can you do that here for that money.
- 2) You cannot order online dollars store, it's all US, and they will not ship to Canadian individuals, only the Dollar Stores.
- 3) Dollar Stores here will not order you stuff.
- 4) We got our noise canceling headphone \$14.50 and dark safety glasses \$7.95 from home hardware at a deal, not cheap, but their cost. Try yours, barring that Darrell or I could get you some at the same (unless price has gone up) price.
- 5) We looked on the Autism society website at their kits and did a bit of research.
- 6) We felt after talking to teachers and support workers, fidget spinners were a problem in class, snacks were a problem for choking/allergy/expiry dates, play dough was a choking hazard, and do go off/ bad. We eliminated those items.
- 7) Amazon was not cheaper than the dollars store
- 8) Due to supply chain issues, you might have to do several shopping trips to several stores.
- 9) Have a shopping committee, have a pack party, we did it one night after the meeting, it got done quite quickly. (bring several pairs of scissors)
- 10) Remove all tags, packaging (not word cards- leave in card box) for easy access by end user and for no negative sensory extra bits. (like a tag on a stuffy)
- 11) We set a budget of \$500- spent \$530, made 10 full kits, 5 more backups missing flash cards. We have about 3 more kits in partial stages as well.

Our kits/ Shopping list:

- * Mini backpack- dollar tree \$1.50
- * Simple Word flash cards- dollar tree \$1.50, alternate source Walmart \$3.98
- * White board with pen (check size for fit in backpack)- dollar tree1.50, alternate source Walmart \$2.98
- * Stuffy- Dollar Tree \$1.50
- * Noise reducing headphones- home hardware- \$14.50
- * Light reducing dark safety glasses- home hardware- \$7.95 these could be cheaper elsewhere but we wanted ones that were harder to break.
- * Stress ball- Dollar Tree- 2pkg. for \$1.50

There are many troubling phrases in our language that we use without considering their full meaning simply because they have been accepted into common use. Even as our ideals progress, our language maintains some phrases from our past that no longer serve us, for example boys don't cry, boys will be boys, good child, problem child, illegitimate child, and many more. While these phrases may be used without harmful intent, they are inherently negative. Children can be especially sensitive to such phrases, which may stay with them their whole lives, adversely affecting their self-image and wounding their self-esteem. We can create positive change by choosing not to use these words and phrases.

It is challenging to examine our habits in terms of the words we use to express ourselves, but it is also exciting. Language is an area where we can exercise our free will, creating positive change in the world around us by carefully choosing the words we use. It may seem like a small thing, but our words have a rippling effect, like a stone thrown in a pond. People naturally pick up on the way other people speak, consciously or unconsciously changing the way they speak in response. We don't need to actively try to influence people; it happens without even thinking about it. All we have to do is choose to be more conscious, putting to rest words and phrases that are outmoded, insensitive, or harmful. We can also exercise our creativity by creating new phrases that carry positive and loving energy to replace the old ones.

You may already have some ideas about phrases you'd like to transition out of your language, and now that you're thinking about it, you may come across many more. As you consciously decide not to use these phrases, you may feel lighter and more joyful, knowing that you have chosen to drop baggage that was handed down to you from a less conscious time. As you do so, you elevate the language for future generations who would no doubt thank you if they could.

CANDY CANE SNOWMEN

Ingredients:

30 Big Kraft Jet-Puffed Marshmallows

10 Candy Canes

10 Hershey Kisses (unwrapped)

Pull and Peel Twizzlers (10 strands)

30 red mini M&Ms


10 Reese's Pieces Minis

White Icing (to act as glue)

Black Gel Icing

Clean Screwdriver (believe me, it works!)

Instructions:



- 2. Take one long rope of the Twizzlers and wrap between the middle and top marshmallow to create a scarf.
- 3. Dab just a bit of icing on a Hershey Kiss and put on the top of the top marshmallow as a hat.
- 4. Dab a tiny bit of icing on three red mini M&Ms and put them on the front of the marshmallows like buttons.
- 5. Cut one Reese's Pieces Mini (orange) in half and with a dab of icing attach it to the top marshmallow as a nose.
- 6. Dab two eyes with the black gel icing.
- 7. You are done! If you are super creative, use pretzel sticks as arms but I don't think it needs it.

Makes: 10 Snowmen

Christmas Mice Candy

PREP TIME15 minutes ADDITIONAL TIME15 minutes TOTAL TIME30 minutes

Ingredients

- 15 Hershey kisses
- 15 Red Hots candies
- 15 Maraschino cherries (WITH stems)
- ½ cup Chocolate chips
- 30 Peanut halves
- · Small tube of black icing

Instructions

- 1. Line a baking sheet with wax paper and set aside.
- Place the cherries on a paper towel-lined plate and pat them dry to get as much moisture off of them as possible.
- 3. Melt the chocolate chips according to package directions.
- Holding the stem of a cherry, dip it into the melted chocolate. Place the chocolate coated cherry on its side on the prepared baking sheet.
- 5. Press a Hershey's Kiss into the opposite side of the cherry from the stem.
- 6. Add two peanut halves in the top between the cherry and Hershey's Kiss for the mouse's ears.
- Add a dab of melted chocolate on the back of a red hot and place it on the end of the Hershey's Kiss for the mouse's nose.
- Use the black icing to dot two eyes on the Hershey's Kiss to complete the mouse. Repeat this process with the remaining ingredients.





Makes about 80 bites

- · 1 cup butter, cubed
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1 1/2 tsp vanilla
- 2 1/4 cups flour
- sprinkles of your choice -optional

INSTRUCTIONS

- Preheat oven to 350F.
- · Beat butter and sugar together.
- Mix in vanilla.
- Add flour and beat well. Dough will have a sandy texture.
- Add sprinkles and beat again.
- Work dough with hands until it forms a ball.
- Press dough into a 9x13 pan that has been lined with parchment paper.
- Chill for 1 hour.
- Grabbing the parchment paper, remove the dough from the pan and cut it into
- bitesize squares.
- Place squares 1 inch apart on a greased cookie sheet. Bake for 9-11 minutes or
- · until bottoms begin to brown.
- You will have to make a couple batches.

Ingredients


- 1 16 oz jar(s) unsalted peanuts
- 1 16 oz. jar(s) salted peanuts
- 1 12 oz bag(s) semi-sweet chocolate chips
- 1 12 oz bag(s) milk chocolate chips
- 2 10 oz bag(s) peanut butter chips
- 2 1 lb pkg white almond bark or vanilla candy coating

How to Make It

1 Layer all ingredients in a large crockpot (starting with peanuts). Turn the pot on low, cover with lid, and leave sitting for 2 hours. Then, remove lid and stir to combine. Replace lid and leave sitting for another 30 minutes. Stir again and then spoon mixture on to wax paper or non-stick aluminum foil. Allow to harden for at least 1 hour. Enjoy!



We finally had our first in person meeting this month and Civitan Cheryl picked up Tims coffee and tea and Timbits from our winnings from the spring convention.










The club has put together 10 Autism kits for our police services and dropped them off. This is a great project]



Reasons to consider Becoming an Organ Donor

- 1. The need is tremendous every day there are thousand of people on a waiting list for an organ.
- 2. People are dying while waiting for an organ.
- 3. One donor can save many lives.

A single organ donor can save up to eight lives. Tissue donors can help heal up to 75 people. People who donate their corneas can restore sight to two people. People are eligible to donate across the age spectrum.

4. More diverse donors are needed.

More donors from all backgrounds are needed. But it is especially important for more people from diverse backgrounds to sign up to be organ donors.

- 5. **Organ donation can be a rewarding and positive experience**. It can help a family work through the grieving process and deal with their loss by knowing their loved one is helping save the lives of others.
- 6. Very few medical conditions disqualify you from donating your organs. It may be determined that certain organs are not suitable for transplantation, but other tissues and organs may be fine. Simply put, a disease in one organ does not preclude other organs from being donated.

7. Most religions support organ donation. This includes Catholics, Protestants, Islam and most branches of Judaism who see it as the final act of love and generosity toward others.
















Two Past Governors from the East pass away a week apart:
